A NOTE FROM PASTOR KINNDLEE

"When the Lord restored the fortunes of Zion, we were like those who dream . . ." Psalm 126:1

Dear CLC faith family and friends,

When I was a child, I used to love to daydream. How about you? Do you consider yourself a dreamer? Do you have positive, negative or ambivalent associations with the idea of dreams? Or do you perhaps have dreams that have left you feeling disappointed and broken, maybe dreams you have had to defer or give up on altogether? This Advent season, I am excited to introduce you to our theme: "Those Who Dream." We will be exploring this idea throughout December and into January, ending with Epiphany. This may strike you as an unusual theme for the season—what happened to "Joy to the World" or "Prince of Peace?"—

But my hope is that our reflections will ignite new ideas, visions and dreams in you during this Advent season. What new dreams might you have for your life or the future of Christ Lutheran Church? The theme "Those Who Dream" comes from Psalm 126, a reading for the Third Sunday of Advent, verse 1: "When the Lord restored the fortunes of Zion, we were like those who dream . . ." Our theme explores how many of the people in the stories of Advent and Epiphany, from the psalmists, to John the Baptist, Mary, Simeon and Anna, all the way to the Magi, were all dreamers in one way or another. They all received, responded to, or dared to dream God's dream of a world redeemed and loved. Advent, in fact, is a season like no other in which we are invited to step into the mystery and awe of that dream as we invite Christ to be once again birthed into our lives and hearts and as we pray that God's dream will shape our reality and world anew.

Rev. Sarah Are, one of the creators of the "Those Who Dream" resource, said this about the theme itself:

"[In this short phrase of Psalm 126], I could see the dreams within church basements filled with AA and grief support groups. I could see the dreams within Pride festivals, Black Lives Matter marches in the streets, and couples longing to be parents. I could see the dreams of congregations fighting decline and teenagers fighting for a cleaner planet. And I could see the dream of Advent—a space and time set aside to remember that God is with us. So this Advent, we invite you to join us in dreaming—as an act of hope, as an act of resistance, as an act of faith."

What a beautiful invitation to dream together, right?

This theme also reminds me of the story of Pentecost in Acts 2:17, where God is quoted via the prophet Joel as saying, "In the last days it will be . . . that I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh, and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, and your young men shall see visions, and your old men shall dream dreams." Isn't it wonderful that no matter what stage of life we are in, God invites us to see new visions and dream new dreams? Has the Spirit been sowing something in your heart? Now is the time to explore it together. Whether these are the last days or the first days, my prayer for this Advent season is that we will be immersed and enfolded in God's dreams for us and our world. We will practice being people who dream along with God through our Sunday worship, sermons, music and special liturgies, as well as through daily devotionals that will be made available filled with poetry, scriptural reflections and artwork. I am excited for our first Advent together. Won't you join me in dreaming?

2023 MATCHING GIFT PROGRAM WRAP-UP

A huge thank you to everyone who donated to our 2023 matching gift fundraiser! This year there were five organizations eligible for a 1 to 1 match of up to \$2,000. The organizations were: Community Christian Service Agency (CCSA), The Rwandan Orphans Project (ROP), GiGi's Playhouse of San Diego, Shoreline Community Services, and Agape San Diego (formerly Agape House). When all donations were counted, all five organizations eligible for matching gift received the full \$2,000 match! We received \$13,144 in donations, matched with \$10,000 in matching funds for a total of \$23,144 sent to these organizations.

2023 GIVING TREES

This year, we are providing multiple giving opportunities for alternative Christmas Gifts or to help those less fortunate this holiday season. In the sanctuary at CLC, you will see three colored trees. Each of these trees has ornaments for a different giving opportunity.

The blue tree is for the ELCA Good Gifts program. If someone on your gift list is hard to shop for, or if you are wondering what to get for the person who already has everything, think about pulling an ornament from the ELCA Good Gifts tree and donating in someone's honor. This program allows you to donate to purchase things like goats, bees, hygiene kits, and the like in areas that need them most. There are many different ornaments with a variety of items and price points, so you can match the person you are giving in honor of to a cause that will be meaningful to them. The Purple tree is for the CCSA Christmas Gift Basket Program. CCSA is trying to deliver festive Christmas baskets full of nonperishable food and gift cards for perishables to families in need so they can celebrate the holiday with a delicious Christmas meal. CLC is trying to gather supplies for multiple baskets, so we have divided the baskets into smaller items and are asking you to consider donating all or part of a basket. You can take the ornaments for the items you want to buy from the tree, and then bring the items to CLC on or before December 10. You can also make a monetary donation, and we can use it to fill in the items we do not receive.

The white tree is for Shoreline Community Services' cold weather resources drive. Shoreline Community Services, which operates the Compass Station at God's Garage, is gathering donations of hats, gloves, sleeping bags, jackets, etc for people experiencing homelessness to help them survive the cold of winter. They have an Amazon wish list you can buy items from directly, or you can donate to CLC and specify Shoreline, or even a specific item, and we will purchase the items for you.

All of these programs are working to help at a local level to get needed resources to those struggling. We thank you for your donations to any of these programs.



FINANCE REPORT NOVEMBER 2023

I just wanted to give you a few notes on the finances in CLC. You probably received a giving statement towards the beginning of November with a pledge card and stewardship letter. This is the last statement you will receive before the end of the year, so please check it over for accuracy. It's much easier to make changes now than after the year has ended.

If you did not return your pledge card for 2024 in time for commitment Sunday on November 26, it's not too late! You can mail or bring them in still! They are a very useful tool for our financial planning.

For 2024, we will no longer be providing numbered offering envelope booklets. We can provide you with a box of generic envelopes if they would be useful to you, and I can give you your new number to include on your checks. If you have any questions or concerns about this, please don't hesitate to let me know.

In order for a gift to show up on your giving statement for 2023, donations need to be postmarked by December 30 (since the 31st is a Sunday).

We are currently running a deficit of about \$13,000 for 2023, and are behind in our offerings income. I have seen CLC come back from deficits much more significant than this to end the year with a positive cash flow. As we approach the end of the year, please consider making an additional gift to Christ Lutheran Church to help us end the year in a healthy financial position.

Thank you all for your generosity and faithfulness. I am grateful for all of you.



CCSA is providing food and other services to a record number of people of all ages, from the youngest to great-grandparents.



Top 10 Native Plants to attract wildlife into your garden:


Bush Monkey Flower

Cleveland Sage (salvia)
Baccharis (coyote bush)
Holly Cherry shrub
Lemonade Berry
Manzanita
Scrub Oak
Toyon
